### First important steps

**Carefully read this guide.** Do you have any further questions? Do not hesitate to contact us at <u>bbe@wu.ac.at</u>.

**Enroll at WU:** Please check our <u>online application guide</u> (step 3: admission) for detailed information on enrolment at WU.

Pay the ÖH Students' Union dues and/or tuition fees (= re-registration): Keep in mind that you have to re-register for each semester. The deadline for the winter semester is always October 31, and for the summer semester March 31. The payment must be done by this date, otherwise, you will be automatically unenrolled from your degree program and you will not be able to complete any courses or take any exams in that semester.

Activate your student <u>ID card</u> at the information desk on level 0 in building LC. Please note that it is not possible to activate your student ID card immediately after receiving it.

#### Customize your WU account and change your password.

Find your log in data on the personal account datasheet that you receive at the admission appointment. Check your <u>WU e-mail account</u> regularly. We will send all important information to your WU e-mail address.

Attend the BBE Welcome Days: The BBE Welcome Days will take place on September 26 and September 27. Find more information on page 8.

Prepare for your first courses at WU: Your courses will start on October 4, 2022. You will have to register for the courses. Find more information on page 12.

### **Essential to know**

Starting from the winter semester 2022/23, the following regulations will apply, which will also affect your studies at WU. Please consider these points when planning your studies.

#### MINIMUM ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE


If you enroll to a Bachelor's degree program, you must complete a total of 16 ECTS credits in this program during the first 4 semesters. This applies to firstsemester students and students who change their Bachelor's degree program equally. Credit transfer can only be included if the recognized examination was taken during your degree program and not before your admission. If the minimum academic performance of 16 ECTS credits cannot be proven after this period, the admission to your degree program expires. A new admission to the same degree program at WU is only permitted again after 2 academic years.

#### **CREDIT TRANSFER**

Recognition of examinations you have already taken before your admission must be applied for by the end of your second semester at the latest. After this deadline, no further applications are permitted. However, you can apply for recognition of all examinations right after admission, even including those for the main course of your study program.

Please keep in mind that this deadline does not apply for parallel degree programs or studying abroad. In these cases, you can still apply for credit transfer until you graduate.

**Tip:** Do not apply for recognition of free electives until the end of the second semester, until you know whether you want to complete a semester abroad, courses from the Language Centre or Social Engagement, so that you still have enough ECTS credits left in your free electives and can structure your studies the way you want.

#### COURSES

#### Academic integrity

We are committed to academic integrity, honesty, and fairness, and we expect students to comply with our rules and regulations. This means that any form of "foul play" (e.g. plagiarism) is considered a serious offense; it will lead to you being dropped from the course in question. Please ask your course instructor about the rules for citations and references in any kind of written paper (e.g. essay, report, homework) you have to submit. More detailed information is available on our <u>website</u>.

#### Your timetable

University is very different from school. You will be expected to be self-organized and remember dates and deadlines for course registrations, administrative tasks, and coursework. You will not be reminded by WU staff or professors, so you will have to be proactive and regularly check your WU email account and the dates and deadlines information online.

#### **Course registration**

You will need to register for your courses online using the <u>LPIS</u> system. We recommend logging on to LPIS at least once before the registration period starts to make sure you are familiar with the online tool. Registration for courses at WU is on a first-come, first-served basis, meaning that those who sign up for a course first will receive a place in the course. Once the course is full, you can no longer sign up for that particular course. The waiting list service is not available for BBE core courses. Do not sign up for the waiting list. However, you may use the course exchange service.

#### **Course structure**

Most courses are taught in a seminar-like format and require your attendance and active participation.

Courses are graded based on all your contributions such as reports, presentations, group assignments, and written or oral exams. For detailed information about the different course types, please see our <u>website</u>. Moreover, they will also be explained in the next subchapter.

#### Examinations and course types

BBE courses are mainly organized as lectures with interactive elements (VUE), continuous assessment courses (PI), and workshop-type courses (AG). In these course types you will automatically be registered for exams and do not have to sign up for them separately. Exams are held either in the last regular class session or on predefined dates which will be indicated in the courses' syllabi. For detailed information about course types, please check our <u>website</u>.

Course-specific grading criteria can be found in the course syllabi and the lecturers will explain them. You are entitled to detailed feedback on grading from the lecturers upon request. Exam results will be published within four weeks of the examination date, and appointments will be available to allow you to review your exam and ask any questions you may have about the exam and your results. Additional assignments for extra credit are usually not an option.

If you fail a course (grade 5), you will have to repeat the whole course. If you miss a performance component that is essential for the successful completion of a course (e.g. the final exam) due to illness or accident confirmed by a doctor's certificate, you are allowed to repeat the component or compensate for it another way. Do you want to retake a course because you are not satisfied with your grade? Please note that it is only possible to retake positively graded courses within 12 months.

#### **Course instructors**

Academic life in Austria is rather formal. Usually students are expected to address professors with their titles. Some professors may offer you a more informal form of communication with them, but be sure to wait until it is offered before addressing a professor informally.

Punctuality is appreciated in Austria, so be sure to be in class on time. If you have to miss a class, always inform the professor by email before the class starts. Most WU lecturers do not have formal office hours, but you can arrange an appointment with them through email or talk to them directly after class.

Your professors as well as other WU staff members will usually communicate with you by email, so make sure to check your WU email account regularly. WU appreciates professional and respectful oral and written communication with faculty, staff, and fellow students.

#### Credits

WU uses the European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) to assess and compare student workload. Each course is assigned a certain number of ECTS credits, 1 ECTS accounts for 25 working hours. Most of the BBE core courses will be worth 6 ECTS credits (= workload of 150 hours). This means that on average, a student has to devote 150 hours of work to successfully pass the course. Working hours are not the same as contact hours: Contact hours are the time spent in class with your professors, while working hours are spent mainly doing independent study and group assignments. Credits for a course are only earned when you fulfill all the requirements to pass the course. We have listed the ECTS credits for each course on our website.

#### Austrian grading system

The Austrian grading system may differ from the grading system of your home country. The Austrian grade scale is structured as follows:

- 1 (excellent/sehr gut)
- 2 (good/gut)
- 3 (satisfactory/befriedigend)
- 4 (sufficient/genügend)
- 5 (fail/nicht genügend)

Please don't be disappointed if you don't receive grades as good as you are used to from school. If you are not satisfied with a grade you may retake the course within 12 months.

#### LEARN

LEARN is WU's eLearning platform, and is accessed using your WU login and password. It offers many services in the following key areas:

- Studying and practicing (course contents, learning materials, preparing for exams)
- Organization (personal schedule with all your course dates, portal for downloading and handing in assignments)
- Communicating and sharing (discussion forums with other students, professors, and program coordinators)

#### LPIS

On <u>LPIS</u> you sign up for courses and exams. You have access with your WU login and password.

#### eVVZ

eVVZ is WU's course catalog, where you can find detailed information on your courses including syllabi, class dates, and other useful information. You do not have to log in to eVVZ to check the courses.

There are a variety of different mailing lists that you will be subscribed to automatically as a student. It is not possible to unsubscribe from the mailing list WU-Studierende, but all others are optional and can be unsubscribed from as needed.

In Austria, your WU student ID card is an official photo ID and must be presented **when taking an exam.** It is valid for one semester.

# The WU campus and its facilities

### WU LIBRARIES AND THEIR LOCATIONS

Our WU library branches are available to all WU students on campus:

- > Central Library, LC building
- OeNB Library for Social Sciences, D4 building
- > Library for Law, D3 building

You can access the library with your student ID card. For detailed information and opening hours, please visit the <u>University Library website</u> and read the library's brochure.

The library is not just for borrowing books, it also offers many quiet study areas, consultations, workshops and elearning material on academic research. WU's libraries are normally closed on Sundays but during exam preparation weeks, extended opening hours are being offered. However, there are several other libraries in Vienna that are open on Sundays (e.g. the Austrian National Library, MAK Reading Room, University Library of the Medical University Vienna, and the library in the Architekturzentrum Wien).

#### FACILITIES FOR INDEPENDENT STUDY

- Student work stations at the WU's library branches
- Project rooms can be booked by students for group study activities

You can book project rooms with your WU login and WU password using the online reservation tool "<u>Rooms</u>."

#### **BUSINESS LANGUAGE CENTER**

The <u>Business Language Center</u> is a stateof-the-art language learning facility available to all WU students and faculty members. The center offers materials and eLearning software in over 30 languages for self-directed learning.

The <u>Tandem Learning Program</u> offered by the Language Resource Center is also a great way to supplement your language learning. The program allows you to improve your skills in the language of your choice in an informal environment with a native-speaker tandem partner.

The Business Language Center is located on level 2 in the Central Library in building LC.

#### **IT SUPPORT CENTER**

The IT Support Center is located in the D2 building (entrance C, room D2.0.191). Detailed information about their services is available <u>online</u>. The Support Center offers many IT-related services including:

- › Laptop rentals
- > Printing credits
- › Problem-solving for WiFi connections
- > Technical support in PC labs

#### **SPORTS ON CAMPUS**

Campus WU is located right next to Vienna's largest recreational area, Prater Park, where you can do any number of outdoor sports. Stadionbad, an outdoor swimming pool, is within walking distance from WU. WU also has on-campus athletic facilities:


- Large gym for indoor sports (D2/SC building)
- Aerobics room (D2/SC building)
- Fitness center (D2/SC building)
- Basketball court (outside, between the EA and D4 buildings)
- Table tennis (outside, between the D5 and D3 buildings)
- Secure bicycle parking

The athletic facilities and aerobics courses in D2/SC building have to be booked through USI Wien, the University of Vienna's sports' institute. <u>USI</u> offers a wide selection of classes and the use of athletic facilities to students at reduced rate. You can register for courses online or in person at the institute. Course registration is on a firstcome, first-served basis.

ÖH (Students' Union) also organizes athletic events and provides information on athletic activities. There are several sports teams at WU. For more detailed information, please visit the ÖH office in the SC building.

# Living in Vienna

#### **REGISTRATION IN AUSTRIA**

#### Registration in Vienna: the Meldezettel

All students (no matter if you are an EU/ EEA citizen or third-country national) are required to register with their district Registration Office (Meldeamt) within three days after arrival in Austria.

Registration offices are located in the Municipal District Offices ("Magistratisches Bezirksamt" or "Amtshaus"). For a list of addresses, please click <u>here</u>.

#### **Residency permits and visas**

Different regulations apply for citizens of EU/EEA countries and Switzerland than for third-country nationals. Please check our online info guide.

#### ACCOMMODATIONS

On-campus dormitories are not common in Austria, and students usually live either in off-campus student residence halls or in private apartments. Unlike in many other countries, Austrian universities do not automatically assign you a dorm room when you enroll in a program; students are responsible for finding their own accommodations. A shared apartment is called a Wohngemeinschaft (abbreviated: WG) in German. When looking online for a room in a shared apartment, we recommend using, among others, the search term "WG Wien".

#### INSURANCE

If you do not have insurance that covers your stay in Austria, you are strongly advised to purchase the student health insurance policy offered by the <u>Österreichische Gesundheitskasse</u> (ÖGK) or by one of the many other private insurance providers. Generally speaking, Vienna is one of the safest cities in the world. Nevertheless, all rules that apply for larger cities worldwide apply to Vienna as well.

#### BANK ACCOUNT – AUSTRIA, A COUNTRY OF CASH

Austria is a country of cash. Many places, e.g. cafes, restaurants, clubs, or cabs, do not accept bank or credit cards or only for bills or fares above a certain amount, so we recommend always having some cash (€) with you. ATMs (Bankomat in German) can be found throughout the city.

#### WORKING IN AUSTRIA

The <u>WU ZBP Career Center</u> provides you with important information on your career during and after your studies. They offer daily walk-in services and interesting workshops. Please note that BBE is a full-time program and classes work with attendance requirements. Hence, we recommend to check out the first semester to find out how much time will be left for a job.

#### TRANSPORTATION

#### **Public transportation**

We strongly advise you to purchase a student semester ticket in order to use the subways, buses, and streetcars of the Wiener Linien (Vienna's public transportation service, www.wienerlinien.at). The student semester ticket costs  $\in$  75 if you have registered your main residence in Vienna, and  $\notin$  150 for non-residents. Subways, buses, and streetcars operate every day from around 5am – 1am. On weekends, the subway lines run all night. WienMobil is a useful app for navigating Vienna's public transportation system.

Please note that Vienna International Airport (VIE) is located outside of the city of Vienna and therefore is not included in the semester ticket. You need to buy an extra ticket valid from the Vienna city border.

#### Getting to the city from VIE airport

The Vienna International Airport (VIE) is located approx. 16 km to the east of Vienna in Schwechat. The quickest and easiest way to get to the center of Vienna from the airport is by public transport or by taxi.

#### SHOPPING AND SUPERMARKETS

Vienna's biggest shopping areas with the best selection of different shops are Mariahilfer Straße and Kärntner Straße. However, all kind of shops can be found throughout the city and in your neighborhoods. Please note that most shops are closed at night and on Sundays, except at large railway stations (e.g. Praterstern, Westbahnhof, Landstraße) and gas stations.
