Short course description	The course "Globalisation and Social Policy I" refreshes basic socio-economic concepts in the design and implementation of social policy and builds in-depth knowledge on specific areas of social policy. It thus aims to improve and deepen the understanding of key concepts and theories of social policy and social policy analysis by applying them to specific areas of social policy and examining global and local challenges to the welfare state. A specific aim is to examine how globalisation can be linked to national and sub-national social policy. Some topics are explored and taught via student group projects. For each of the topics, student groups are given key readings. In previous semesters respective topics included: social dumping, migration and social protection (internationalization and social protection, health and social care workforce migration, refugees) and the future of social protection (social protection and the platform economy, climate change and social policy, sustainable welfare beyond growth).
